2 From Our Pastor

5 Trinity Teens & 20s

9 Fall Kickoff

I broke down in the Cub Foods parking lot. Right there, in one of the designated parking spots for Pick Up, I wept. A wave of sad responsibility forced tears to roll down my face. The air conditioning fan in my car drowned out the sound of little sobs, and that realization brought more sadness. I took some deep breaths. I was not quite ready when the woman with a cart of three paper bags filled with groceries appeared to verify my name. Frozen chicken and salmon, a box of NoName steaks—petite cut. Strawberries and kiwi and apples, French bread, two kinds of milk—1% and soy, a jar of applesauce, and a box of rice. That was my online order. I am fortunate. I work hard, of course, but I am privileged. We have enough. Add the garden veggies and it's a full meal—several of them!



Earlier that day a family had entered the church building requesting food and funds. They said they were heading south to family in Texas and needed gas money; they would be most appreciative of any food, cards, or cash we could offer. The Monticello Help Center was closed, and they were almost out of gas. The father introduced the others—I did not understand the names. He said he did not have an ID. This is a problem, he knew. He said his work visa had expired. He said that they had bought this car from a guy he used to work with and hoped it would get them to Texas. Their minivan, which looked like it had seen better days, had a pile of clothes and blankets in the back.

Was it “a line”? A scam? A family in need or a family preying on the kindness of others? Were they running from the law? Were they going from church to church begging for assistance? We didn't know. We still don't. And yet, “when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or...” had echoed in my mind. Is this Jesus? I mean, is this Jesus in “the least of these?” When did we see you...?

The children scarfed down the office water and personal snacks that Karen provided, and all four took turns using the restroom. Just getting out of their car to stretch their legs and sit for a while in air conditioning seemed to be refreshing. They waited to talk, and Karen found a couple of gift cards a generous congregation member had left for the office to sparingly give away. A card to Cub, a card to Holiday. We scoured the shelves, cupboards, and freezer, coming up with a few microwave soups and some cupcakes. It wasn't much but it was what we had at Trinity. The girls' eyes lit up—cupcakes! We prayed with the family. Prayed right there by the blue couch. Prayed that God would watch over them as they traveled. Prayed for their health, for their vehicle to make it to Texas, for opportunities to stop and rest. Prayed that God would put others in their path along the way who could also share what they had. Prayed God would multiply what little we provided like the five loaves and two fish. They drove away in a van without air conditioning. It was 90+ degrees.

Fast forward a couple of weeks. A letter arrives describing the lack of accessibility to clean water, basic medicine, and education in Africa. Still. I think, “how long, O Lord, how long?” like the Psalmist crying in Psalm 13. How can people be so patient? We clamored for vaccines, and research labs had a brand new one to us in less than a year. We can drink from the faucet or the hose or even the toilet most days, add nothing, and not get sick. We can send our children or grandchildren to schools in the area or keep them home and teach them ourselves. We are fortunate. We are privileged.

A day or two later, a worshipper returns from Liberia and shows pictures of an abandoned school—abandoned during a civil war. Grandparents had scooped up children and babies and fled to a neighboring country after one or both parents never returned from an errand. An entire generation did not have access to education as buildings, basic school supplies, and teachers were not available. For years. I think, “incline your ear, O Lord, and answer!” like the Psalmist in Psalm 86. How can people be so patient? We demanded schools reopen and teachers to provide extra assistance in all kinds of ways, and districts provided electronics and internet and hired as many parent aides as possible. We can use spell-check, and Google, and if a pen runs out of ink, there are probably three more in “the junk drawer” or even on the ground in the parking lot! We are fortunate. We are privileged.

Yes, gas prices are up, and electricity, and grocery costs have increased too, but most of us will not completely “go without” this month. Maybe we trim back a little. Maybe we make our lunch instead of buying it. Maybe we do not go out to eat, we cook at home. Maybe we find a carpool, or clip a coupon, or redeem some rewards. Maybe we dial back the A/C temp or turn off the sprinkler. Maybe we dip into savings or don’t save as much. The belt is tighter, but it is not cutting off our circulation.

The reality check is good sometimes. We are fortunate; we are privileged--but it doesn’t feel like that many days. The checkbook balance is only double digits after the mortgage, utilities, and medical bills are paid. Then we encounter real hunger, real thirst, real homelessness or real desolation, and it stops us in our tracks. I don’t know about you, but I need that perspective. I needed that reminder. I needed that face of Jesus in the face of the stranger or the face of a neighbor.

I vowed that day that no traveler would leave hungry if they came to Trinity in need. There are now several loaves of bread in the freezer and jars of peanut butter in the office. There is real juice in the fridge and applesauce, cereal, and dehydrated milk on a special shelf in the kitchen. Perhaps select other canned goods that need no heating or refrigeration will be added in the future. \$25 gift cards through Scrip, or even purchased directly from the establishment, could help with gas or groceries. You’ve heard of Little Free Libraries? This is like a little food shelf. Not intended to replace the Help Center, this is an emergency supplement. Because no one should go hungry.



This is not a new idea. Other churches and communities have pre-packed “Blessing Boxes” or Little Food Pantries, often outside, for the homeless, the hungry, or the food insecure to simply grab and go. In most inner-city communities, people are respectful and only take one box—even though three might be sitting in a doorway—or one day’s worth. Truly a literal “Give us this day our daily bread.”

If you have the capacity and heart to share from what bounty you might have, little or great, you could make a donation to purchase gift cards to grocery stores and/or gas stations. Perhaps your Christian conscience says \$10, \$25, or \$100 for a stranger to buy food or fill up their gas tank is recognizing Jesus in “the other”? If you want to go above and beyond your regular contribution, to make a difference for someone in need—someone you probably don’t know but Jesus does—special “Needy Travelers” envelopes are available on the Welcome Desk. Let your heart and the Spirit lead you. There is so much need in the world.



Update From Our Council President

As customary, the Council did not meet in July due to the number of family vacations and related activities. Although summer is sometimes seen as a “down time”, church leadership is more than busy looking at the various upcoming responsibilities including developing the mission statements, revision of the constitution, and the continuous process of reviewing how we can enhance our church services and church’s role in the community.

It is commonly accepted that one of the most valuable tools for increasing membership is for current worshippers to invite people in their lives to attend Trinity and experience what we have to offer. When we do so, often we need some description of what makes our church unique. One of our many unique features is the respect given to all congregants’ personal theological views. This is best illustrated by having two young people from our congregation present sermons in place of our Pastor who was on vacation. We all share but have our differences as we see our mission from God, and respecting these different missions makes our church a safe haven for building faith. Some churches are organized “top-down”; that is power, control, and the mission are established by the church leadership and the congregants are expected to accept and follow. Other churches are organized “bottom-up” where the congregants are given considerable say, control, and power over church functions, and their views on theology are respected and considered by the church’s spiritual leaders. Trinity is best described as a “bottom-up” church. Our Pastor has indicated on a number of occasions how much she has learned and gained from theological discussions with congregants and especially noted how much the confirmation class, with their youthful perspectives, has contributed to our church’s understanding of the “here and now” world. The Church Council views their role as providing leadership, but this leadership needs to be founded on the faith journeys of all our congregants. This requires a Council that both leads and listens. It is our hope and intent to be a church that respects the congregants’ perspectives, to inspire action and become more involved.
